On Sunday, August 28th Historical Society members and friends were given a rare treat, being entertained with hilarious and sometimes touching stories, as well as with photos and songs by Graham McGrath and his wife Jo, in the library.

Graham told us how in 1967, he was appointed to his first teaching position at Mabel Creek Station, a one teacher school, where he, being city born and bred, found everything and everybody totally new and foreign. He was greeted with the expression, "Eh Schoolie!" a name which remained with him that whole year, and is the name of his book written about those early teaching experiences, and later life.

Music became a central part of Graham's life, starting from his early teaching days when he was taught to play guitar by the stockman at Mabel Creek, Bango Walkington. Years later, with Jo and their two children, their family band performed at functions, and now in retirement, Graham and Jo travel the country, entertaining residents in Nursing Homes, singing favourites from the 50's and 60's as well as songs written and arranged by Graham himself.

Graham's book "Eh Schoolie" will soon be available to buy from Underground Books and will also be in the School Library. In August next year, Graham and Jo are planning to be in Coober Pedy again when it is hoped that a larger venue can be arranged for a bigger audience.

For the Historical Society, Graham's photos and information about Mabel Creek were a much appreciated addition to the history that we are presently collecting in preparation for a day trip planned on Sunday September 25th to Mabel Creek Station.
